LAMBERT:

(introduces subject and speaker) WHAT IS AMATEUR RADIO OR

WHAT IS A RADIO AMATEUR?

STENZ:

WELL, TOM, AMATEUR RADIO IS A HOBBY, A SCIENTIFIC HOBBY. MORE THAN THAT, EVERY RADIO AMATEUR WHO PURSUES THIS HOBBY IS A MEMBER OF AN INTERNATIONAL FRATERNITY. THERE ARE ABOUT 250,000 RADIO AMATEURS, OR HAMS, AS THEY ARE CALLED, IN THE WORLD TODAY. NEARLY 200,000 ARE IN THE UNITED STATES. TO DEFINE A RADIC AMATEUR, I THINK WE WOULD HAVE TO CALL HIM A COMMUNICATOR AND AN EXPERIMENTER. HE ENJOYS TALKING WITH OTHER AMATEURS THROUGHOUT THE WORLD BY USE OF THE RADIO EQUIPMENT HE HAS BUILT. HIS TRANSMITTER MAY BE THE RESULT OF HIS OWN DESIGN AND EXPERIMENTATION, OR IT MAY BE BUILT FROM A SIMPLE KIT ... THE SAME TYPE OF KIT THAT A HI FI FAN MIGHT ASSEMBLE HIS STEREO PHONOGRAPH FROM. THE HAM HAS THE ADVANTAGE THAT, WHEN HE TALKS INTO THIS PIECE OF HARDWARE, HE HAS KINK CONSTRUCTED, A NEW COUNTRY MIGHT ANSWER BACK, OR PERHAPS IT WILL BE THE VOICE OF AN OLD FRIEND. HE MIGHT NEVER MEET THIS FRIEND IN PERSON EVEN THOUGH THEY TALK TOGETHER EVERY DAY. EVEN TALKING WITH A STATION IN RUSSIA WOULD NOT BE UNCOMMON, AND HERE MORSE CODE WOULD BE

WHAT DO THESE PEOPLE TALK ABOUT WHEN THEY MAKE CONTACT BY

TWO WAY RADIO?

ANYTHING AND EVERYTHING. AFTER DISCUSSING THE WEATHER AND THE

BASEBALL SITUATION, THE TOPIC USUALLY COMES AROUND TO THE

EQUIPMENT BEING USED. THIS IS NOT UNUSUAL SINCE MOST AMATEURS

HAVE INVESTED MANY HOURS IN THE BUILDING OF THEIR STATION.

USUALLY MORE HOURS THAN DOLLARS.

HOW MUCH WOULD AN AMATEUR STATION COST ?

AS WITH ANY HOBBY, THE INVESTMENT CAN BE ANYWHERE FROM \$10

UP. I WOULD SAY THE AVERAGE MIGHT BE LESS THAN \$100. AS AN

EXAMPLE, THE TRANSMITTER I HAVE IN MY CAR WAS ASSEMBLED FROM

A KIT THAT COST \$40. BY EXPERIMENTING WITH SURPLUS AND USED

PARTS, THE COST COULD BE KEPT VERY LOW.

AS AN EXPERIMENTER, THE AMATEUR IS FAMOUS. THE AMATEUR IS

CONSTANTLY IN THE FOREFRONT OF TECHNICAL PROGRESS BECAUSE OF

HIS CURIOSITY AND EAGERNESS TO TRY ANYTHING NEW. IT TOOK

AMATEURS TO PROVE THAT HIGH FREQUENCY TRANSATLANTIC COMMUNI-

CATIONS WAS POSSIBLE IN 1923. HE HAS THE TIME AND WILLINGNESS

TO TRY NEW IDEAS THAT RESEARCH ORGANIZATIONS WOULD NOT FIND

WORTH THEIR MONEY TO EXPERIMENT WITH.

HOW DOES ONE BECOME A RADIO AMATEUR?

THE FEDERAL COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION REGULATES AMATEUR RADIO

JUST AS IT REGULATES COMMERCIAL RADIO OR RADIO OF ANY KIND IN

THE UNITED STATES. THERE IS AN EXAMINATION WHICH COSTS

NOTHING AND WHICH COVERS RULES AND REGULATIONS, SOME RADIO

THEORY, AND A TEST IN MORSE CODE. THE MORSE CODE IS NECESSARY

EVEN IF THE OPERATOR DOESN'T INTEND TO USE IT BECAUSE OF

POSSIBLE EMERGENCY SITUATIONS. IN AN EMERGENCY A TRANSMITTER

TO SEND CODE WOULD BE VERY EASY TO CONSTRUCT FROM PRACTICALLY

...ANY PIECE OF EQUIPMENT THAT HAS A TUBE IN IT. WITH
THIS A MAN COULD CALL FOR HELP WITH THE CONFIDENCE THAT
EVERY AMATEUR CAN READ AND UNDERSTAND HIS SOS BY MORSE CODE.

EMERGENCIES

BUT HOW OFTEN DO THESE EMERGENICES HAPPEN ?

STENZ:

LAMBERT':

MORE OFTEN THAN WE WOULD LIKE, TOM. AFTER EVERY HURRICANE
OR FLOOD, YOU WILL READ ABOUT HOW AMATEURS FURNISHED
COMMUNICATION WHILE TELEPHONE LINES AND REGULAR CHANNELS
WERE DOWN OR TIED UP. THE AMATEURS HAVE A VAST ACCUMULATION
OF COMMUNICATION EQUIPMENT THAT IS ALWAYS READY BECAUSE THEY
USE IT EVERY DAY. YOU WILL FIND THAT HAMS ARE QUITE OFTEN
THE CORE OF CIVIL DEFENSE. FOR THE REASON THAT IT SERVES
THE PUBLIC INTEREST IN THIS FORM AND IN MANY OTHER WAYS, SUCH AS
COMMUNICATION WITH SERVICEMEN OVERSEAS, I THINK THAT AMATEUR
RADIO IS A WORTHWHILE HOBBY....AND IT'S LOTS OF FUN.
